Memories of Nature

olidays are the perfect points in the year to relax and enjoy all the wonders that nature has to offer. It's often the smallest things that will bring happy memories of past holidays rushing back. For four-year-old Millicent, she will always remember playing in the bright fall leaves of North Adelaide, Australia with her mother. She was fascinated both by their size and their vibrant colors.

"Millicent's Adelaide" is a shadowbox that was created for a collection of fall leaves found along the wide streets of North Adelaide. North Adelaide is a

The simplest objects—like a leaf collected on a trip can evoke happy memories when beautifully displayed. suburb of the City of Adelaide in the state of South Australia, situated just north of the River Torrens and within the beautiful Adelaide Park Lands. Millicent and her family had

stayed there while her father was in town for business, and when it was time to go

home, Millicent's mother decided to have a few of her favorite leaves framed to preserve the happy memory.



The customer was involved througout the design process; for example, choosing the font that was used for the inscription.

Drying the Leaves

Place the leaves between two sheets of wax

Materials

Matboard:	Bainbridge Alpharag A8640 Antique White 4-ply
Backing Board:	Bainbridge Artcare archival foam board
Outer Frame:	Larson-Luhl Allegra 284712 gold 3/4" wide
Inner slip:	Partos Plus 3002GL Italian gold leaf 5/8" wide,
	cut vertically
Glazing:	Tru Vue Museum Glass
Calligraphy:	Kunstler Script by Gunnar CMC with pen attachment

paper, ensuring that the leaves do not overlap. Open a large book and place the sheets between the pages. Close the book and lay it flat for safekeeping. Place weights on top of the book and check once a week until the leaves are dry. When drying multiple leaves in the same book, allow several pages (at least ¹/₈") between each sheet of leaves.

Iron to Preserve Color

This method works best on fresh leaves that have not yet started to dry. Place one leaf between two sheets of wax paper, and put a scrap of matboard or a piece of calico on top. Heat with a dry clothes iron, no steam, for two to five minutes, or until the leaf is dry. Turn the



leaf over and repeat on the other side. Once the leaf is dry, cut the wax paper close to the leaf and peel away each side. Wax from the paper will remain on the leaf, helping to preserve its color.

Designing the Frame

A simple arrangement of the leaves was created at the design table with Millicent and her mother. It's always a great idea to include the clients in the design process, especially when a child is involved. A photograph of the design was taken as a reference.

An additional custom touch was the inclusion of the inscription "Millicent's Adelaide," which was written on the matboard using a Gunnar CMC with a pen tool attachment before the placement of the leaves. The font used was a customer favourite, "Kunstler Script." Most fonts can be downloaded and added to your CMC's software if it is not included as standard.

The matboard chosen was Bainbridge Alpharag 100 percent cotton board in Antique White. The leaves were glued into place on the matboard with Lineco Neutral pH Adhesive. A piece of glass was placed over the top, and the arrangement was allowed to dry for a few hours.

The warm, gold autumnal tones and the delicate leaf embossing of the frame perfectly complemented the subject matter. Additionally, the 1³/₈" rabbet depth housed the three-dimensional project with ease. A piece of Tru Vue Museum Glass was placed into the frame, followed by a vertically cut ⁵/₈" Italian gold leaf slip (liner) to create the space needed to ensure the leaves did not touch the glass. The matboard with the leaves attached was placed into the frame along with an Alphamat Artcare backing board for strength and protection, and then the frame was sealed.

The end result: Millicent was a very happy customer,

both with her leaf collection and her frame design.

The subjects for interesting and memorable shadowbox designs needn't always be expensive or "touristy." Sentimental objects as simple as a stone found along the side of a road, or a vibrant autumn leaf plucked from the ground by a curious child, can evoke the happiest of holiday memories. As the framer, all you have to do is create a beautiful display for such objects—and watch the smiles unfold. **PFM**
